PLEASE NOTE: On Sunday, July 31, 2016, Most Rev. Michael J. Sheehan, Archbishop Emeritus, will preside at the 9:30 A.M. Mass celebrating San Ignacio Parish's 100th year anniversary. A grand procession will follow through the neighborhood. The fiesta will feature live entertainment, traditional New Mexican food, and games for children. Personal/Historic stories will be told by members of the founding families who have made San Ignacio their home since its inception. Rev. Andrew J. Pavlak, pastor of San Felipe, serves as canonical minister. The parish life coordinator for San Ignacio is Deacon Robert W. Morrow, who also serves as the main pastoral minister. The church is the nucleus of the historic neighborhood of Martineztown/Santa Barbara. According to former Mayor Kinney in his Executive Order for the 60th anniversary, which was held in 1976, "San Ignacio is considered by many city residents to be on one of the more famous landmarks in our city and is called by many as a center point for the community and as an important social influence."

Background: Fr. Joseph Arthuis, S.J., the first pastor of San Ignacio, repeated his favorite motto in his letters and in his conversations, "Rejoice in the Lord." Padre Jose also rejoiced when San Ignacio was built in 1916 in Albuquerque, New Mexico in the heart of the Santa Barbara/Martineztown Community. Fr. Arthuis was born in Brittany, France on October 23, 1854. He came from a religious family, which included; three brothers who served as priests and one sister who served as a nun. Fr. Arthuis studied three years in Jersey, England. His superiors received a telegram asking him to go to the United States. He was the manager of the Jesuit publication, *Revista Catolica Catholic Review*, the only Catholic Spanish weekly magazine in the country. Fr. Arthuis was also the minister of the Jesuit College in Morrison, CO. He then served as minister of the newly opened College of the Sacred Heart in Denver. During this time, Fr. Arthuis suffered ill health. Fr. Arthuis arrived in Albuquerque to serve as a priest at San Felipe de Neri Church in 1907. He would routinely say the annual Novena to San Ignacio de Loyola in the month of July. This prompted him to be the Presider for the Mass at a community called San Ignacio. He was quick to see the need for a church in this new community. "Padre Jose," as the parishioners affectionately called him, would arrive daily on his horse and buggy to help the community by making his share of adobes for this new San Ignacio Church, in spite of his physical suffering. Through the leadership of Fr. Arthuis and the men who lived in the Santa Barbara/Martineztown Neighborhood, their volunteer skills and talents were used for the construction of the church. San Ignacio de Loyola Church was dedicated on the Feast of San Ignacio, July 31, 1916, by Archbishop John Baptist Pitavil. San Ignacio continues to provide nourishment to the families of the community through baptisms, weddings, funerals and other sacraments. The church is the nucleus of the historic neighborhood of Martineztown/Santa Barbara.

Q July 26 is the feast of Joachim and Anna. Who are they and what do we know about them?

Joachim and Anna are the parents of Mary, the mother of Jesus, yet there is absolutely no biblical reference to them whatsoever. So where do we get their names, and what is their story?

A Their names are found in an apocryphal (hidden) gospel known as "The Infancy Gospel of James." Apocryphal, or hidden gospels, consist of accounts of Jesus' life that were ultimately not accepted as inspired works, and thus were not included in the Bible. However, they sometimes captured the Christian imagination, spilling into the devotional dimension of the community.

James' infancy gospel begins with the parents of Mary and their desire for a child. In their prayer and petitions to God, they are heard and given the blessings of a child, whom they named Mary. While we have no idea who Mary's parents really were, the fact that we celebrate the feast of Joachim and Anna indicates that the bond of family love is important in the Christian life.

Long before Grandparents' Day was established, the church had a feast that honored the presumed grandparents of Jesus. While their names are part of non-inspired apocryphal legends, the fact of the Savior's human ancestry is not. Christ, the incarnate Word, dwelt among us in the flesh in a human family. In honoring the grandparents of Jesus we really proclaim our faith in the Incarnation—God becoming human!

17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: Big cities can have a special attraction. The commercial areas can be alive with such hustle and bustle. Walking past store windows and sidewalk restaurants can enliven one's spirit as the great mass of humanity seems to be undulating with all the excitement of commerce and exchange. In large cities one can often hear multiple languages just by walking a few blocks as people from different parts of the world mix together on the sidewalks of America. Walk a few blocks in any big city and it is likely that you will come upon someone begging or panhandling on the street. In some places the beggars are very discreet, just sitting on a bench or a sidewalk with a paper cup in their hand that may have a few coins in it so as not to attract the attention of the police. In other places, the begging may be more aggressive with requests hurled at passersby. In a big city, every beggar has his regulars who give him something when they see him. But there are also the hundreds who will pass by. And then there are the occasional visitors who are unsure whether to heed the beggars' pleas or not.

In the Gospel this weekend, the disciples of Jesus ask him to teach them how to pray. He then goes on to describe for them the nature of prayer. He reminds the disciples not to give up. They must be persistent in their prayer, asking for what is needed. Most of us probably can't ever conceive of ourselves as beggars sitting on the street corner of some large city, even though it is likely that at some point in our lives we have seen them (and maybe even given them something). But that is exactly what we are every time we pray the Lord's Prayer. After all, we pray, "Give us this day our daily bread." You can't be much more of a beggar than that!
